Medi-Cal Reimbursement for Lactation Services: Introduction

Low-income women have access to breastfeeding education and support through WIC and other programs, but lack adequate access to lactation services for problems with breastfeeding. MCH Access conducted preliminary research on this issue by interviewing lactation consultants and their billing department representatives from local community clinics and hospitals. Overall, we found that for the most part, lactation consultants and Medi-Cal providers are not getting Medi-Cal reimbursement for lactation services and are instead seeking other avenues to provide such services to their clients. We spoke with numerous contacts at the state and national levels to find out how to improve the reimbursement system.

<u>Presentations/Case Examples</u> Agnes de la Vega, MCH Access . Vivian Weinstein/W.M. Keck Policy Fellow

Agnes presented an overview of the breastfeeding-related components of the Comprehensive Perinatal Services Program (CPSP), Medi-Cal (both Fee-For-Service and Medi-Cal Managed Care), Durable Medical Equipment (DME), overall barriers, and offered suggestions for potential improvements. The PowerPoint presentation details specific findings and research from our needs assessment. Agnes also shared information obtained from the Medi-Cal

Policy Division on the number of paid breast pump claims for the years 2002-2004 (a chart with this information was included in the packet of materials distributed). Overall, paid claims have substantially declined over the last three years, for unknown reasons.

Magdalena Estrada, ICCE, IBCLC, California Hospital, Women's Health Center and Dee Clay & Asela Chavez, Wilmington Community Clinic provided background to their sites' billing practices and experiences with both FQHC status and interaction with managed care plans and prior authorization.

Carol Phillips, PHN, Comprehensive Perinatal Services Program, provided an overview of the CPSP, including the combined prenatal and postpartum assessments that providers are required to do, which include infant feeding assessments. Copies of the assessment were distributed, as well as the protocols that providers are supposed to use for intervention/following up on infant feeding plans.

Discussion

Additional information was shared via the meeting participants and speakers on the phone, including:

- Lactation consultants cannot bill Medi-Cal independently because they are not licensed and could not get licensure except through legislation.
- The moratorium on issuing new DME provider numbers was instituted seven years ago, but is specific to pharmacies/DME suppliers.
- The \$2.72/day rental rate for a hospital grade electric breast pump would have to be increased via legislative action.

Several Issues were identified needing further clarification or additional exploration. A letter requesting clarification and making recommendations will be sent

- Who can request prior authorization?
- Can women get pre-authorization (before infant's birth) for breast pumps, since it takes so long at the time they are needed?
- Can lactation services be billed on the child's Medi-Cal card?

Potential changes/improvements: Register complaints for denial of claims to the State Insurance Commissioner's Office or others – need standardized way to register complaints that all providers and consultants know of and regular feedback on amount/type of complaints. Further explore possible negative impact of breast pumps as DME and exempt breast pumps from current restrictions on DMEs .January 2005 Governor's Summit on Obesity

Prevention - increasing access to lactation services could come through this obesity initiative. The Governor's recommendations will be available for public comment. When it is released, distribute to lactation groups for comment.

- Carla Robles of the Medi-Cal Policy Division will research the issue of billing on the child's card.
- Clarify HMO process for Medi-Cal: is there an urgent request/authorization process? Can one be created? Work with HMOs to educate providers.
- Explore the possibility of billing on the mother's Medi-Cal card beyond the 60 day postpartum period for a woman who continues her Restricted Medi-Cal.

NEW since meeting:

Hospital waiver creates concerns: A

difference of opinion exists over the proposal by the Schwarzenegger administration to create a new federal waiver for the way "disproportionate share" hospitals (those that see many Medi-Cal and uninsured) are reimbursed (see LA Times, 6-10-05, "State Plan for Poor's Healthcare Draws Fire"). The California Hospital Association is certain some hospitals would close if the deal is pushed throiugh. At the very least there is agreement that no increases would occur in the later years of the five-year arrangement, which would cost hospitals due to health care inflation. Public hospitals also say they would have to seek shortfalls in funding from counties.
